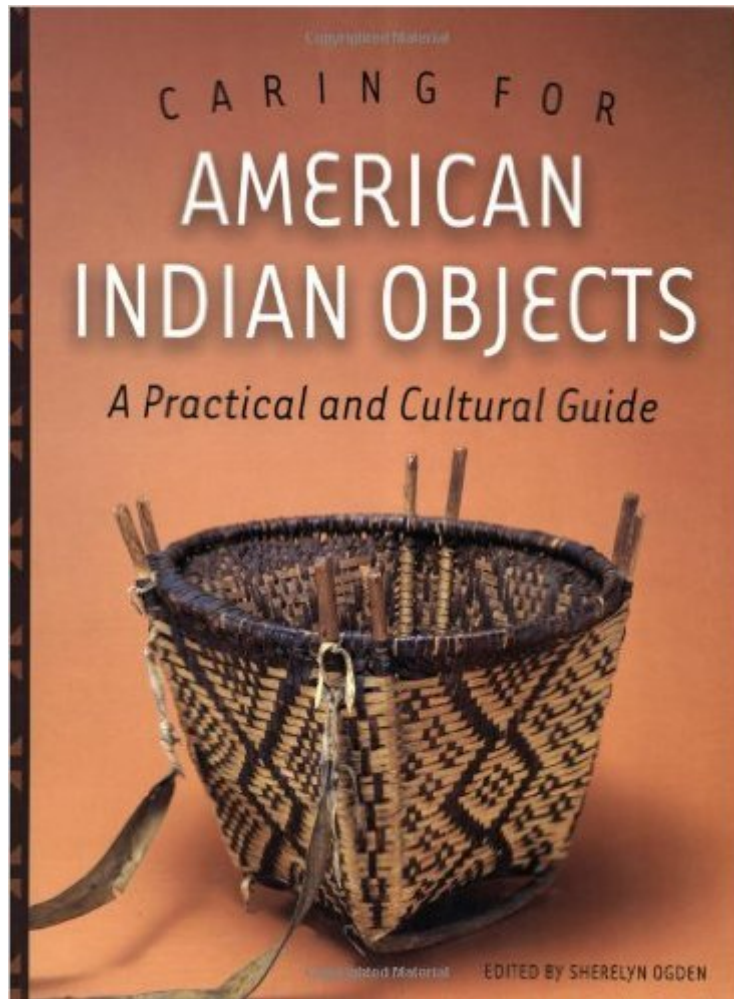


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# Caring For American Indian Objects: A Practical And Cultural Guide
